George Amielis at the last general election, which apportionment entitles each county to the following representation: Ada 6, Alturas 2, Bear Lake 4, Boise 5, Idaho 9, Lemhi 4, Nez Perce 4, Owyhee 4, Oneida 3, Shoshone 1, Cassia 2 and Washington 2.

It was ordered that the convention meet at Boise City, on September 17th, 1880, at 10 o'clock a.m., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress. Delegates to the convention are to be elected by the various County Conventions.

The board of appointment for Idaho last week completed their work in good order. No report yet.

Whether talks of moving the Territorial capital to Blackfoot, Ho must think that the Capitol, like his press, is "on wheels."

Blackfoot has lately been the scene of considerable lawlessness. Such things are to be expected where an unpopulated place is tolerated.

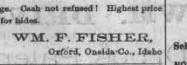

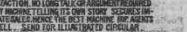
