A GOOD SPEECH.

The little, big speech made by Governor Murray on Independence Day should be read and studied by every man and woman in Utah. There is nothing sectional in it, as has been charged, it is broad as the Republic, and only appeals to the intelligence of men to see to it that what is a crime in every other Territory and State of the Republic shall not be shielded here.

It appeals to me to put aside superstitions and to advance the bright light of this century, to put aside that which debases man by making the masses stupid tools of the cunning leaders. Is there anything unreasonable or unjust, anything that is not necessary in all this?

His appeal was to young Utah. He can see as the leaders of the M. rem. must see that their only hope is in the ignorant foreigners. Without such additions this whole system which makes Utah a strain to the R. public, and keeps her forever out of the Union of States, would not last a decade.

The celebration in Salt Lake City on Monday was most satisfactory. Despite all the omens which forebode a failure there was a procession which lacked only one block of being two miles long; and that procession almost every trade and business of the Territory was recruited.

It was young Utah coming to the front and for the first time manifesting itself. It revealed the fact that there are many people in Utah who are willing to celebrate the Fourth of July, to make a grand display as they come forth to hail the 51st birth of the Nation.

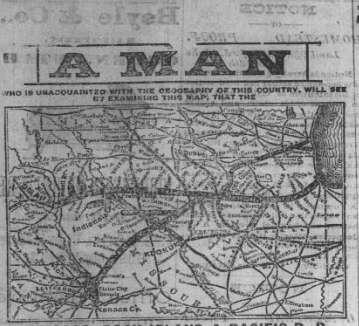
