REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY.
The Report of the Territorial Grand Jury for the May term, attended to the small amount of crime committed in the county during the past year, the satisfactory manner in which the accounts and record have been kept, he commended some needed repairs upon the county jail, and closed with the usual tender of thanks to Judge McCreary and Dist. Atty. Crawford, in these words: "we have full faith in the honesty, ability and integrity of the District Attorney, Willard Crawford." This last was intended as a final quietus to the malicious rumors with which the air was heavy during the term.

The following affidavit explains itself, but in connection therewith we wish to say that we have no doubts that any explanation from Judge Crawford would set at rest any rumors affecting his standing before the people of Idaho. A true, honest statement, we feel certain would relieve the public mind from the delusion stories now extant affecting him. We have been informed by members of the Grand Jury that some enemies of Mr. Crawford did attempt to procure an indictment against him, but they were refused a piece of state work and refused to sign upon the testimony of the Grand Jury. Judge Crawford, in our opinion, made but one mistake in the Anderson matter, and that was in not publishing the testimony taken at the post mortem examination on Anderson's body. This would have silenced and spiked his enemies guns in the start and left them no point of attack.
