The new line of the Utah & Northern railway is out, to take effect tomorrow the 24th of October at 11 a.m. Under the new arrangement the train will meet at Oxford at half past one o'clock a.m. instead of at Swan Lake as heretofore.

Birth of Eagle Rock.

Our writes to the Logan Leader as follows: Yesterday the first of ashore was nicely washed by rain—the first for a long time, and this morning everything looks clean and bright. The distant Rocky Mountain ranges, the Medicine Lodge and Blue Tooth ranges each about a hundred miles distant, are crowned with a distinct coronet of snow. Crops in this section look well, but are late. Some very fine oats and potatoes are growing not far from here, as far as I have seen anywhere. This will be found a good farming country as soon as an energetic, industrious people will settle it. M. D. Hildebrandt's company of graduates have nearly finished the first branch of Snake River ditch which is about nine miles long.

It will require very large streams of water, and require a great breadth of good land. The water has been running in the upper six miles for several weeks, and proves that work per cent success. Some idea may be formed of the magnitude of the work from the fact that the he-digite alone cost the constant labor of twenty-five men for more than three months.

Some 55,000 feet of timber and lumber has been used in constructing the rock work. The work is in charge of J. H. Martineau, Civil and Hydraulic Engineer, and H. H. Fox, Register.

This county is excited at the prospect that the Utah & Northern shops are to be located at Eagle Rock, and hundreds have already set piles of money ready to drop into their hands as soon as the change is made.

Should the change be made, no doubt quite a few will spring up at Eagle Rock. It is understood here that a road house will be made for at least one mile, and that the machine, car, and repair shops will employ some 300 hands.

Five or six new locomotives are to be fitted with water, to be at the use of the line, and this will give an idea of the business this road does.

The Capital Restaurant, a frame house, was burned about 8 o'clock Wednesday morning. The building stood between Camp's brick store and Earl's brick house, which kept the fire from spreading. The little candy and fruit store, adjoining and owned by John Beck, was also consumed.

The loss of Mr. Fred Stump proprietor of the restaurant, was six or seven hundred dollars. That of Mr. John Earley, owner of the building, counting in damage to his store, books, etc., including \$500, or \$600 in cash, was between \$200 and \$300. Mr. Stump saved nothing and worst of all, lost all his books and papers. The fire originated in the kitchen.

Bugs Chisley, one of the noted Modoc warriors, is in Boise city. The total membership of the order of Good Templars in Idaho Territory is 258.

Quite a number of new buildings are going up at Boise City and the price of property is on the raise.

Next Tuesday is election day in Ohio and Indiana. We sit them both down as Republicans states.

Ohio, about 10,000 majority, and Indiana about half that majority. The Carter mill, at Bonanza, will be ready to run about November 1st. It will be ninety feet high, with five stories. It has a capacity for forty stamps, but will start up with twenty-five.

Do They Forget. We wonder if the citizens of Slim City have forgotten the real candidate Delegate Anaisie and the well known Montana Brother of Bear Lake County made of them eyes. One hundred dollars was the partial cost of that big junk, without counting the cost of the loss of the actor to friends who had voted for the Delegate. They will not vote for him again we imagine.

Judge A. Reed has been nominated by the democrats of Lemhi County for the council. It would be well for the boys up in Lemhi to examine the Judge's record down at the county seat and see about the fig leaf arrangements, as we are not all together as yet but he struck the celebrated "Grease vat" when down this way the last time. It would be well to keep a look out on the matter at least.

Can't Swallow Him. Not one newspaper in Idaho, democratic or republican, supports Anaisie heartily. The Democrat at Boise city is an "all-an" supporter, but is very careful to not say anything in his favor.

The Independent, a weekly democratic paper of Idaho, to wit and tenth George, has to be a decent honest man, by electing Cahalan or Alanson Smith as delegate to the next congress. They ought to give Bishop Anaisie as well as all the democrats who attempt to run the party through the election of John Taylor or Apostle Cannon to understand that such things can't be done, and receive the vote of decent members of that party.

Now is the time to begin the work by giving Anaisie the "grand boue."

Some Reasons. The Motion picture cannot support Anaisie for several reasons viz: 1st. His promises to him of support in case of his election are again, are made as he says "to catch the day" and how that he will make up the voting element of that church.

2d. If the members of that church have a spark of manhood about them they will not vote for a man who cannot issue an order and the law being in force to obey it and "wade" solid for him. The motion picture boys are pretends to believe in the "word of wisdom" as their guide on Temperance matters. If they do, they must vote for Anaisie because he is one of the most thoroughly confirmed hard drinkers in Idaho.

HERD MURDERED. Shooting Affray Between Two Cattle Drivers at Fort Hall.

A fearful tragedy occurred about sunrise on Sunday morning, the 25th instant, in the southwestern portion of the Fort Hall Reservation, this Territory, resulting in the death of one man and wounding of another. A party of herders were encamped on Hamock Creek, looking after a large number of cattle belonging to Ryan & Lang, of Cheyenne, Wyoming. Among others were Gratton Thomson, Charles Lyons, W. M. Cook, John Lackey, Joseph Trus, James Cannon, Richard Park and Thomas Walker. It appears that Thomson, a lad of about 16 years of age, was detailed to cook for the party and early on the morning in question, Lyons, before starting to look after his cattle, called Thomson to get up and prepare breakfast, when angry words passed between them, in which Lyons threatened to whip Thomson. Upon Lyons' return to camp Thomson opened fire upon him, inflicting a flesh wound in the left side, whereupon Lyons fired killing him instantly. Lyons from Texas, and has a bad conscience. Both the dead and wounded men were removed to a point near the Fort Hall Agency, where a physician dressed the wounds of the latter and the dead man was buried. The murderer was arrested and conveyed to jail at Boise City.

Both of these parties were employed at Kansas City, Missouri, last spring, by the above mentioned firm, with city orders, to go to Oregon for the purpose of driving cattle thence to Cheyenne, and the cattle had reached the point of difficulty on the journey when the affair happened. An inquest was held upon the body of the deceased by Judge Joseph Warren of Blackfoot prior to burial.

WILL CAHALAN RUN. The Boise City Republican says it understands from reliable sources that T. D. Cahalan will come out as an independent anti-Mormon Democratic candidate for Delegate to Congress. We hope such is the case. Tom is the most popular Democrat in Idaho, and one who would work faithfully for the inter-ests of the whole Territory, and would pull a large vote, both Democrat and Republican. We hear that, looking but dissatisfied at the nomination that has been made. The nominees were not the choice of the mass of voters on either side.

The county convention, run by a few politicians, selected the delegates. Had every voter in the Territory been given a voice in making the nomination neither Smith nor Anaisie would have been hoisted to the head of the ticket. If Cahalan will announce himself as an independent candidate his chances for election will be very favorable. Voters are in no way bound to support the candidate whom they had no say in making, and will cast their votes for the man they consider best fitted to represent their interests, and that man will be T. D. Cahalan, if he will be a candidate. Anaisie, the most unpopular man in the democratic party, has been allowed to go to it by a few and now those few expect to whip the voters into line, but we don't think they will be whipped. Two years ago the delegates to the Territorial Convention were elected, by a direct vote, which was due to the work of Hon. John M. Cannady, and this is the only way to get at a true expression of the choice of the party; but this time the wishes of the voters were not consulted. They were not wanted. It would have left Anaisie out in the cold in his proper place. Two years ago Anaisie, we believe received nineteen votes in the convention, and Cahalan eighteen, and it is the general impression throughout the Territory that the former secured his nomination by foul means. Whether this is true or not, Anaisie's popularity since that time has been on the wane. Announce yourself, Tom, and send Smith and Anaisie in sailing up the river with you.
