Ordered that E. J. Jarvis fix and repair the road within his District fourthward, and endeavor, if possible, to make said roads passable for

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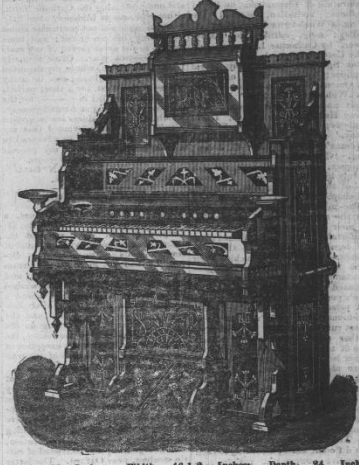
