A resolution introduced in the Senate to supply each Senator with a \$1,200 clerk, was rejected by a vote of 28 to 20.

President Villard has issued an order that hereafter there shall be sold to no person more than 160 acres of Northern Pacific lands.

A lawn dinner was given last week by ex-Governor Claflin, of New York, to Harriet Beecher Stowe, in honor of her seventieth birthday.

The distinguished literati of the country were present.

Trinity Church, New York, is the wealthiest religious corporation in the United States; its property being worth \$50,000,000.

Its charter dates back to grants made by William and Mary in 1644.

THE UTAH COMMISSION.

The President has nominated Senator Alex. Ramsey, of Minnesota, ex-Senator Faddock, of Nebraska, J. F. Goddard, of Iowa, Ambrose R. Carlton, of Indiana, and James H. Pettigrew, of Arkansas, to constitute the Utah Commission. The nominations are regarded as strong and the three former are Republicans, and the latter two Democrats. Mr. Ramsey and Mr. Faddock are ex-United States Senators, and are widely and favorably known throughout the country. Mr. Ramsey was Secretary of War during part of Hayes' administration. Mr. Goddard is Assistant United States District Attorney for the Des Moines District, Iowa, and is a lawyer of fine ability. Mr. Carlton and Mr. Pettigrew are prominent politicians, and are widely known in their respective States. They are all men of high character, and are very fortunate in having so good a Commission to preside over their future destinies.

From a private letter received from Low Melville we learn that the weather out in Idaho is rather cold—freezes every night. It says he thinks that the part of Idaho he is now in is not as well as they got the other places fixed. We judge from this remark that he is not well pleased with the country—Missouri Valley (Iowa) Times.

A New York lawyer got a fee of \$5,500,000, probably the largest amount of fee ever earned in the world. He was the attorney for a large iron-pitting house, in New York, of working goods, upon which a specific duty of fifty cents was imposed. The case was carried into the United States Supreme Court, which rendered a decision refunding the duties collected, which amounted to \$11,000,000. The lawyer gets half.

The San Francisco Chronicle publishes the names of those who have applied for the appointment as members of the Utah Commission. The list is quite large, and among the names are found those of Captain Hooper, Phoebe Cozzens and Belva A. Lockwood. The list is not complete, but having the names of Dr. Mary Walker, Susan B. Anthony or Anna Dickinson.

The President has appointed Robert H. Baker, Wisconsin; George E. Spencer, Alabama; Wm. Partridge, Nebraska; and Isaac H. Bromley, Connecticut, as the Government Dispositors of the Union Pacific. George E. Spencer was formerly United States Senator from Alabama, his term expiring in 1879, and is largely interested in mining.

Robert Farmer Bower died suddenly a short time ago at Keokuk, Iowa. He was the General Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons at the time of his death, which is the highest official position in the United States in that body. The Prince of Wales occupies the same position in Great Britain. Mr. Bower was born in Philadelphia in 1823.

Phoebe Cozzens and Belva A. Lockwood have been left out of the Utah Commission. President Arthur did not want to tempt the Apostles too far.

When Cyrus W. Field first went to New York City, he found employment in the house of A. T. Stewart & Co., on a salary of \$2 per week. He was obliged to be the first at the store in the morning to sweep out, and to remain until the partners and most of the clerks had gone at night.
